We are gearing up for Spring in the art room! Kindergarten artists celebrated Dr. Seuss week by reading the Lorax and talking about ways we can help our earth. We are collaging using torn paper and paint to create grassy hills and Truffula trees! Tidbits of MOTivation with Mrs. Lucia

Occupational therapists often recommend fine motor games that promote handeye coordination and finger dexterity. Examples include:

- 1. Playdough Activities: Rolling, pinching, and molding help enhance hand strength and coordination.
- 2. Puzzles: Working on puzzles encourages precise finger movements and problem-solving skills.
- 3. Stringing Beads: Threading beads onto a string enhances hand-eye coordination and fine motor skills.
- 4. Scissor Skills: Cutting paper into shapes or along lines helps develop hand strength and control.
- 5. Building with Blocks: Assembling blocks fosters fine motor skills and spatial awareness.
- 6. Lacing Cards: Weaving strings through punched holes promotes finger dexterity and coordination.
- 7. Drawing and Coloring: Using crayons, markers, or colored pencils helps refine hand control and grip.
- 8. Buttoning and Zipping Games: Practicing with buttons and zippers aids in developing fine motor skills related to clothing.

Always tailor activities to the child's specific needs and abilities and HAVE FUN!
