First grade is thankful for all of the wonderful experiences we have had this year! Students hiked at Black Rock Forest to observed the habitat of a beaver, observed 3-D shapes during our visit to Storm King Art Center, and showed our school spirit during Color Wars. It is exciting to see students continue to improve by leaps and bounds in reading, writing, and math. If you have some time to cuddle with your child on a chilly day, some good read aloud suggestions are Turkey Trouble by Wendi Silvano, A Turkey for Thanksgiving by Eve Bunting, and Thanksgiving on Thursday by Mary Pope Osborne! We have much to be thankful for!

Sensational second graders are in full gear! We finished our first full unit in Iready math. Ask us to solve one or two step problems, organize data on pictographs and bar graphs, and add using multiple strategies. We are moving to double digit addition with regrouping. We finished our full unit in Social Studies on communities and voting. We held class elections! We are wrapping up personal narrative writing and starting informative writing. In Science, we have begun our unit on Erosion. We also read Turkey Trouble and came up with our own turkey disguises! Check them out! They are displayed in the hallway!

Our inquisitive third graders will be going on a field trip to Locust Grove on December 9th. They will participate in inquiries to study forces and motion by measuring distance and force. On the property is Samual Morse's summer home and the students will also do a house hunt using clues to find artifacts from long ago. They will visit the barn and walk the grounds to see how simple machines can help you work more efficiently. The third graders blew us away as they learned about weather in science. They learned all about weather and climate patterns around the world, and they applied that knowledge to build a roof for a rainy climate. In ELA, we will begin our new unit and will explore pourquoi tales, which explain "why". Afterwards, we will use Book Creator to create books and publish our tales. In Math, we've marched into learning our multiplication facts with the goal of mastering many of them before winter break. Knowing them will help with our next topic: division. So practice those facts on the bus, in the car, and at the dinner table! They are a foundational skill that makes doing math so much easier.

## tidbits of mOTivation with Mrs. Lucia

### Navigating the Holidays with Sensory Sensitivity

The holiday season brings beauty and joy, but for individuals with sensory sensitivities, the change in environment can be stressful and overwhelming. Acknowledge that they perceive their surroundings differently.

#### Potential Overwhelm Triggers

Be aware of common situations that can lead to sensory overload:

- Loud Noise: Music, crowds, and talking.
- · Strong Smells: Seasonal candles, perfumes, or cooking.
- Intense Visuals: Bright, flashing, or excessive lights.
- · Emotional Overload: Over-excitement or anticipating events.
- Physical Closeness: Large crowds or too much physical touch.

#### Recognizing Sensory Overload (Possible Outcomes)

When a loved one is overwhelmed, they may communicate their distress through:

- Emotional outbursts (tantrums, crying)
- Avoidance or withdrawal
- · Increased challenging behaviors (e.g., hitting, biting)

#### Strategies to Help Immediately

If you notice signs of overload, try one of these grounding tasks:

Strategy Category	Immediate Actions to take
Space & Calm	Lead them to a quiet corner or separate room to talk
Movement	Go for a walk or run outside (increases awareness of the body)
Engagement	Offer an easy, focusing task (e.g., stirring ,beading, stickers)
Oral Input	Offer a drink through a straw, or provide crunchy foods
Regulation	Practice deep breathing, read together or sing

#### The Power of Being Present

Be mindful of your surroundings. Your loved one's needs (whether they are big or small) must take priority. A conversation may need to be paused. Sometimes, taking a walk outside feels like "extra work" just to get bundled up, but the resulting calmness and regulation are worth the effort. You are the expert on your loved one.



I can't believe how fast time is flying in the art studio! Our Kindergarten & First grade artists have had art enrichment this past trimester but it will be coming to an end in the next couple of weeks, and then I welcome Second and Third grade to art enrichment! Our first grade artists are working on their turkeys, where we painted papers using the primary colors (red, yellow & blue) and then we used the primary colors to mix and MAKE the secondary colors (orange, green & purple) for the turkeys' feathers. First graders are working on wrapping up their very cute acorn collages. We learned about the pattern called plaid and how to layer colors and line thickness to create our own plaid for the background of our acorn drawings. Second graders are almost done with mosaic owl collages. Third graders have been working on drawings of fall animals and did leaf rubbings with crayons for the background—they are so cute and vibrant! Fourth graders are in the middle of their Andy Warhol Campbell's Soup can project—they are very cool!!

## **Caring Hands with Nurse Katie**



Did you know that the first School Nurse position in the United States was created in New York? It's true. And the birth of School Nursing in the United States is a New York original as well!

In 1893, after moving to NYC's Lower East Side and seeing the terrible living conditions in the local community and schools, forward thinking innovators, nursing pioneers, and social justice queens, Lillian Ward and Mary Brewster, put their passion for Public Health to work. They hired Lina Rogers, a pediatric nurse and overall kiddo expert, to be the first school nurse in NYC schools. Lina saw that many students were sent home from school due to illness and never returned, in addition, she saw that most of those exclusions were treatable with a few environmental changes. Lina educated students and families on hygiene and disease prevention thereby drastically reducing illnesses, exclusions, and chronic absenteeism. To quote Lina Rogers (probably) "Back to class."

So, in short, if you feel like your student sees the nurse entirely too much, perhaps they are simply celebrating NYS rich history of School Health.


